## Fly Control

Our guest speaker, Mr. Howard Johnson from Nozzle Nolen Pest Control, gave us some good information about fly control. We learned that flies are attracted to ultraviolet (UV) light and mosquitoes are attracted to infrared light (heat). This means that a mosquito is not as attracted to UV bug lights as much as flies. Since a warm human body (or chicken body) gives off infrared energy, we appear like neon signs to a mosquito even in pitch darkness.

For fly control around chicken cages, Mr. Johnson suggests that we sprinkle the ground under the cages with fresh water diatomaceous earth. He stressed that salt water diatomaceous earth that is sold in pool supply stores is not the same thing and will not work. Diatomaceous earth is not poisonous, but it is lethal to fly larva. He suggested that a painter's respirator mask be worn while working with the dust because the dust will irritate our lungs until it settles.

He also suggested the use of a new type of bug light. It is essentially a bug zapper with sticky strips instead of an electric grid. The flies are attracted to a UV light in the trap and then get stuck to the sticky boards inside. He mentioned that you can purchase this type of trap at the U. Do It Pest Control store on Northlake Boulevard (881-5578).

Mr. Johnson also left a healthy supply of manual fly killers. If you missed the September meeting, then you missed out on getting a free fly control device.

# The Many Faces of Colonel Sanders



Over the years, the face of Colonel Sanders as Kentucky Fried Chicken's logo has changed from time to time. The last time was in July 1997 which gave the Colonel a new friendlier look. In 1998, Kentucky Fried Chicken (now called KFC) began animating the Colonel for their television ads.

Born in 1890, the story of the Colonel is an interesting one at that. While he had many unsuccessful business ventures during his youth, it was only after he retired at age 62 that success finally struck. He came up with the idea of using a pressure cooker to speed up the time that it took to fry chicken - thus putting chicken in the "fast food" category. Combined with his secret recipe of 11 herbs and spices, the Colonel's chicken became an instant success.

With his wife Claudia left behind to mix and ship his secret blend of 11 herbs and spices, the Colonel hit the road in 1956 at the age of 66 and sold more than 600 Kentucky Fried Chicken Franchises. In 1964, the Colonel sold his company to John Y. Brown Jr. and Jack Massey for \$2,000,000.

The Colonel continued his involvement with KFC throughout the next 16 years, traveling some 250,000 miles a year as KFC's "Goodwill Ambassador." The Colonel died in 1980 at the age of 90. Today, KFC has grown to a global system of over 9,900 restaurants in 76 countries.



The original logo for Kentucky Fried Chicken was created in 1952 by a Salt Lake City advertising agency for the Colonel's first franchisee - Pete Harman.



In 1978, the new owner of Kentucky Fried Chicken gives the logo a new cleaner and simpler look.



In 1991, PepsiCo owns the company. They contemporize the logo and change the name from Kentucky Fried Chicken to simply KFC.



In 1997, the KFC logo becomes bolder, friendlier, and warmer - just like the real Colonel always was. It capitalizes on the immense popularity of Colonel Sanders.
